Special Meeting Minutes January 21, 2020

Chair Gina Batali called the special meeting to order at 6:30 PM. Present were Commissioners YongSuk Cho, Tim Carey, Scott Isenman and Fritz von Ibsch; Fire Chief Hank Teran; Deputy Chief Jared Moravec; Volunteer Program Coordinator Jay Rosenberg; Finance Manager Ed Kaufman; and other Department members.

OATH OF OFFICE

Board Secretary, Chief Hank Teran administered the Oath of Office to recently re-elected Commissioner Fritz von Ibsch.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PRESENTATION

DC Moravec, Anne LeSage, Emergency Management Coordinator for the City of Bainbridge Island, and Scott James, Cofounder of Bainbridge Prepares, presented "Shaping the Future of Community Preparedness: A Whole Community Approach on Bainbridge Island" to the Board. The presentation focused on coordinated emergency preparedness efforts, ongoing throughout the community, led by these three individuals and their respective organizations. The goal of these efforts is to make Bainbridge Island a recognized leader in emergency preparedness in Washington as well as throughout the nation. BUSINESS AGENDA

1. Station 21 Construction Final Acceptance

Chief Teran requested final Board acceptance of the Station 21 construction contract with FORMA Construction. After careful review of all outstanding punch list and warranty items by the Department Build Team, including Commissioners Carey and von Ibsch, the Build Team recommended final acceptance of the \$8,694,099 construction contract with FORMA. Commissioner von Ibsch moved to declare final acceptance of the Station 21 construction contract with FORMA Construction. Commissioner Carey seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

2. 2019 Work Plan Summary

Chief Teran provided a recap of the 2019 Work Plan including the following completed tasks: completion of the Station 22 construction project and final acceptance of Station 21 & 22; successful outcome of the 2019 EMS Levy renewal and changing the status of the levy to permanent; successful completion of the Washington Surveying and Rating Board (WSRB) review; and, successful completion of 2017/2018 biennial audit by the Washington State Auditor's Office. Additional completed tasks in 2019 included, but were not limited too, ILA with the Parks District for landscape maintenance services, conducting

a firefighter test, the Rotary AED project, participating in community podcasts, numerous wildfire presentations and the partnership with the Bainbridge Island Police Department for the equipping and use of the police boat by BIFD. Commissioner Isenman moved to receive and file the 2019 Work Plan Summary as presented. Commissioner von Ibsch seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

3. 2020 Work Plan Proposal

Chief Teran led a discussion of the 2020 Work Plan with the Board, asking for Commissioner input and agreement with the major topics to be included in the plan. The following items were added to the 2020 Work Plan:

Regarding succession planning for the Department, this will address the following positions: Fire Chief, Deputy Chief, Battalion Chief, Lieutenant, Paramedic and Finance Manager. Commissioner Batali stated that it is the Board's intention that the next Fire Chief will be hired from the Deputy Chief's position at that time. Commissioner von Ibsch moved to approve the 2020 Work Plan as outlined above. Commissioner Cho seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Commissioner Cho noted that the upcoming KCFCA meeting will be January 28 in Poulsbo.

Finance Manager Kaufman provided preliminary 2019 financial figures which indicate total revenue of \$11,765,432 and expenses of \$10,849,025. Final numbers will be provided in March.

Finance Manager Kaufman also noted that after polling the membership, the decision has been made to continue the daily subscription of the Kitsap Sun and the weekly subscription of the Bainbridge Review at Station 21 only.

CONSENT AGENDA

(Vouchers totaling \$1,894,056.71, December Payroll, Meeting Minutes 12/18/2019.) Commissioner Isenman moved to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Commissioner Carey seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

BUSINESS AGENDA

4. Resolution #01-2020: Roster Update

Chief Teran requested approval of Resolution #01-2020: Roster Update. This annual resolution memorializes the Department's roster on January 1 of each year and assists with proper authorizing of volunteer benefits. Commissioner Carey moved to approve Resolution #01-2020 as presented. Commissioner von Ibsch seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

5. Resolution #02-2020: Purchasing Cooperative

Chief Teran requested approval of Resolution #02-2020: Purchasing Cooperative. This resolution authorizes Chief Teran to enter into an agreement with Sourcewell, a purchasing cooperative through the State of Minnesota, for the purchase of a new engine as allowed by P&P #130. The engine is included in the 2020 Capital Budget and the Department will realize a \$28,000 savings by pre-paying. Commissioner Cho moved to approve Resolution #02-2020 as presented. Commissioner von Ibsch seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.


